U.S. Data Trends

- 1 in 3 households in the U.S. have been affected.
- More than one million people have died since 1999 from a drug overdose.
- 22.35 million adults in the U.S. are in recovery (9.1%).
- 6.7 million to 7.6 million American adults are estimated to have OUD (4x more than previously known).
- Only 12% of people with OUD got care in 2021.
- Most treatment facilities don't offer medicines yet. Methadone & buprenorphine are the gold standard of care.
- 80% of people with OUD do not need inpatient care and could be successful with outpatient services.


NC Data Trends

- Over 11 North Carolinians died each day from drug overdose in 2022.
- More than 36,000 North Carolinians lost their lives to drug overdose (2000-2022).
- Many more people, families, and communities are impacted.



Remediation Strategies

In line with the National Settlement Agreement, funds "may support programs or services... that serve persons with Opioid Use Disorder (OUD) or any cooccurring Substance Use Disorder (SUD) or mental health condition."

NC MOA Governs Funds and Offers Local Governments Two Options

One or more strategies from a longer list of strategies after engaging in a collaborative strategic planning process with diverse, local stakeholders

MOA Includes 5 Broad Requirements for Local Governments

- 1. Establish and use a special revenue fund
- 2. Authorize spending ahead of time
- 3. Understand and follow Option A and Option B
- 4. Follow all reporting requirements
- 5. Hold annual public meeting
